Program Flomaton: Its History, Heroes and Progressive People

Speaker: Carolyn L. Emerich, Brewton, Al.

Your editor, Mrs. Carolyn Pugh Emerich, has chosen to give a program on Flomaton: Its History, Heroes and Progressive People. The Flomaton area has not been highlighted by a program since a paper was given by Mrs. Korrie G. Brown of Flomaton in 1973 and published in the September, 1973 Escambia County Historical Quarterly. Mrs. Emerich plans to only touch lightly on the information given by Mrs. Brown and will highlight the people who have helped in the growth of the town, the heroes who have made it famous --- Whitby, Manning, McCurdy, the people who made it progressive -- Abernethy, Drury, Wilkerson, Justice, Meriwether, Weaver, and the outlaws who made it infamous- Burrows, Hardin, Hardy, Bowen, Slater. None of the outlaws lived in or near Flomaton but these outlaws used the railroads for transportation and thereby some of their escapades and criminal acts occurred in Flomaton and were recorded among their murderous and plunderous deeds. Flomaton was first known as Reutervill so named by Major Reuter who drove the last spike connecting the railroads, then Pensacola Junction, then Whiting for an early settler and now Flomaton -- a word derivitative from the first 3 letters of FLOrida, the last 200f AlabaMA and TON meaning town. ## MEMORIALS: IN MEMORY OF J. VERNON BRANTLEY

Jac. Vernon Brantley was born in Burnt Corn, Al., Conecuh Co., August 28,1911 and died June 17,1980 in Evergreen, Al. He was the son of A.O. and Mamie Salter Brantley and had deep roots in Conecuh County. He was the great-great grandson of James Salter, the Revolutionary solider buried at Burnt Corn, and of James Grace, the first white settler in upper Conecuh in 1816, and of Green Grantley, Sr. who came to Conecuh in 1827. Vernon graduated from Newton Institute; attended Washington-Lee University and graduated from Howard College. He entered the service and was assigned to the Labor Department as an accountant. He worked at the capitol in Washington, D.C. until his retirement a few years ago. He loved Conecuh and research work and returned to this area to do research work after retirement. He did the reprint of Riley's "History of Conecuh County" and compiled the Brantley Family History and had done extensive work on The James Salter Record. He was a member of several historical societies and was quite active in the Escambia County Historical Society where he will be sorely missed. He is survived by his widow, Ruth Griffin Brantley and nieces and nephews.

IN MEMORY OF ROBERT FREDERICK WEAVER - Born February 9, 1898, died May, 1980. He was a lifelong resident of Brewton and neighboring communities. His great grandfather was the John Weaver who moved from Lexington District, S.C. in 1818, and who contributed much to the growth of this vicinity. Robert Frederick (Fred) Weaver was an exemplary Christian gentleman whose kindness and concern for others will long be remembered. He was a Bible scholar and teacher in the Brewton Church of Christ.

IN MEMORY OF DAVID BRENT MILLER - Husband of Louise Hauss Miller and son of the late Mr. and Mrs. T.R. Miller, died December 7, 1969. He had one daughter, Mrs. Lyman W. Phillips, Jr. and two grandchildren, Susan Phillips and Allen Carlow Phillips. He graduated from Brewton Elementary School, Gulf Coast Military Academy, and attended the University of Alabama. He was always keenly interested in education, showing his interest by many benevolent gifts to local libraries. In 1952, he contributed a 130-volume set of "The War of the Rebellion" to the T.R.Miller High School Library, a rare set including all the official records of the Union and Confederate armies which was supplemented by 3 large Atlases. In 1967, Mr. Miller personally funded the construction of an addition to the Brewton Public Library, consisting of two rooms. The North Wing, now called the David Brent Miller Gallery houses a collection of Audubon Prints, Books and Porcelains. The East Wing was built for a Children's Department. Mr. Miller was First Vice President of T.R. Miller Mill Co., having been associated with the company since 1926. In 1927 he built the Treating Plant which he actively managed until 1941. He was President of Alger-Sullivan Lumber Co.at the time of its liquidation in 1957, having served that company in various official capacities over the years. He was director of Neal Lumber and Manufacturing Co., of Blountstown, Fla., and Vice Chairmanof the Citizens-Farmers and Merchants Bank (now First National Bank). He was a lifelong member of the Brewton Universalist Church and served on the Board of Trustees for many years. He was a 32nd Degree Mason, Knights Templar and Shriner. Civically, he served his community at one time as President of Brewton Rotary Club and Brewton Country Club. During World War II, he served his country as Captain of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. Because of Mr. Miller's interest in education, Mrs. Miller felt that the collection of books (64 volumes) listed in this newsletter would be a memorial to him in keeping with his endeavors during his lifetime.

Thomas E.McMillan, Jr. has purchased for the Reference Center a very rare first edition of "Historical Memoir of the War in West Florida and Louisiana in 1814-15", by A.Lacarriere Latour, published by John Conrad & Co. in Philadelphia 1816, considered to be one of the most valuable sources regarding the New Orleans, Fort Boyer and Pensacola campaigns against the British. The appendix contains documents, correspondence, maps, etc. and it has a separate atlas of handcolored lithograph maps of the campaigns.

THE SIGNIFICANCE OF THE LUTTRELL HARDWARE COMPANY RECORDS in the A recent article in the Mobile Press Register 7/13/80 will Museum help us to understand better the significance of what we have and the importance of continuing to preserve our Luttrell Hardware records until a qualified person can organize and catalogue them. Much of our area's history is hidden away although recorded in these files awaiting discovery. Luttrell sold <u>building materials for</u> many of the early businesses and homes of this area as well as caskets for burial. It is not impractical to continue to procerve them until they can be properly assembled. The article is copied here in its entirety:

MOBILE PRESS REGISTER, July 13, 1980: RAILROAD PAPERS FOUND The golden age of the iron horse in Mobile is being preserved at the University of South Alabama. Aaron Michelson, director of the USA library, has acquired a number of dated documents which are owned by the former Gulf, Mobile and Ohio Railroad, and is in the process of sifting through them for organizational purposes.
"I've had this material for about five years," he said. "Melton
McLaurin, a retired history professor, called and asked if I wanted
some old documents from an abandoned railroad warehouse. I did, and
placed them in the library until recently when they were shipped to
our Brookley complex."

The documents, which go back as far as 1860, consist mostly of business correspondence and financial records, which include ledgers,

payroll accounts, deed and so forth.

"The material is predominantly business records," Michelson said, "but it is interesting to note how industry and sales were conducted in that era. For example, we have one document which states the rail-

road bought land north of Mobile for a few cents an acre."

"A single letter from the War Department gives permission to the railroad to dredge an approach from the United States ship channel to the site of the company's wharves in Mobile River," he continued. "If anyone wanted to do the same thing now, it would take volumes of paperwork for permission to be granted by the government."

What does the university plan to do with the material?

"We presently do not have anyone sorting or cataloging the material on a full time basis," he said. "I am doing my best to organize the

documents and see exactly what we have in our collection."

Several months ago, a vice president of Illinois Central Gulf, the railroad that merged with the old Gulf, Mobile and Ohio company came to the campus to examine the material. According to Michelson, the company is very interested in preserving several of the older pieces in the collection.

"The records allow us to step back in time and note how our community existed up to looyears ago," Michelson said, "and for that

reason alone I feel they are worth saving."

The Luttrell Hardware records were given to the Escambia County Historical Society several years ago and were placed in the museum during Roger Anderson's tenure as Curator for the Museum. We hope that some volunteers from the Society will endeavor to go through these papers and books for us, so that they will take up less space in the museum and significant items can be preserved.
