QUERY

My great grandfather, Joseph Samuel Cooper was born 1842, GA, married Rebecca E. Reeder somewhere in AL, could have been Escambia Co. in 1872. He died in 1906 in Lake Co. FL. He had two sisters that I know of: Catherine, the oldest of the Cooper children, born 1830 GA, married Jacob Shiver 1848, she died in McCullough, AL in 1927. Salana Cooper Galloway born 1832 GA and died 1930 in Bonita Springs, FL. There was at least one brother Thomas Austin Cooper, born 1839 GA and died 1935 in Shelby Co., TX. I believe there were two more brothers-William W. and George T. Cooper, they are all listed together in the 1850 Coffee Co. census with the Samuel and Jacob Shiver family. I think the father's name to the above children was Samuel Cooper and the mother Mary Prestwood. I need to find out what happened to Samuel Cooper and when and where Mary Died. William W. shows in the 1900 Covington Co. census with wife Mary. George T. is in the 1366 census in Conecuh Co. I would also like any information on the Reeder family. Robocca's father was Zack Rooder and mother was Amanda Dyches.
