A labama's only vice president of the United States was Willaim Rufus King.

King, a native of Sampson County, N. C., moved to Alabama in 1816 and was a founder of the city of Selma, and the one who gave the city its name. He also helped draw up Alabama's first constitution at the time it petitioned for statehood.

He was later elected one of the State's first two U. S. Senators, and served three terms in that position before being named ambassador of the annexation of Texas.

In 1852, King was nominated on the Democratic ticket as the running mate of Franklin Pierce, and they won by a landslide. In failing health, he went to Cuba in the hope of regaining his strength. Unable to do so, and failing rapidly, he became the only vice president to be sworn in outside the United States. The cere-

mony was held March 24, 1853 in Cuba. A few days later, knowing that the end was at hand and wanting to die at home, he returned to Selma, where he died April 18, 1853. His will can be found in Dallas County Will Book B.
