The way of the future seems to be moving in the direction of computers in the home as a means of using the Internet. Come on lets all learn to use them!

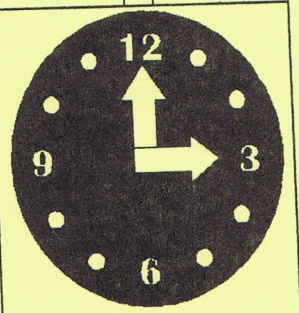
HORSESHOE BEND

Horseshoe Bend located on the Tallapoosa River was once an Indian Village (Creek). It was at this site on March 27, 1814 that General Andrew Jackson defeated the

hostile Red Sticks under the command of Chief Menawa. The Indian name for this Creek Village was Cholocco Litabixee.

The village stood on the banks of the river. They had erected a log breastworks across the peninsula on a ridge near the village.

The attack on the breastworks was made by Jackson, John Coffee's men swam the river to the village and destroyed the Indians' canoes. Almost 1000 Indian warriors were slain in this battle. Winning this battle, Jackson broke the power of the Red Sticks, and they soon surrendered. This area is the site of the Horseshoe Bend National Military Park.
