I hope that all of you read The Brewton Standard's Forgotten Trails by Lydia Grimes, Genealogy Columnist. I find them very interesting and informative. She writes information that I am sure those of you doing research would find helpful.

--You may wonder why I write articles I have read in a Pensacola Newspaper--but as you can see, these are interesting:: "Make this the year to identify your ancestors"--it goes on to say "Ever wonder how many ancestors you will have if you search back 10 generations? In

each generation, the number doubles. For instance, we all have two parents, four grandparents, eight great-grandparents, and 16 great-great-grandparents. By the time you reach the 10th generation-you will have identified 1,024 great-great-great-great-greatgreat-great-great grandparents!" This was taken from Janice Palmer's Southern Roots on February 7--Another article: on February 9--Commentary by Jacqueline Young tells us about "Workshop teaches students about their family history." Some items of interest from the workshop:" It is never too early to introduce students to their family history, learn about family traditions...For example, at a holiday meal, how are family members seated around the table? What kinds of food are served? Who carves the meat? What jokes are repeated from year to year? Answers illuminate the history of a family." "Folklife is an often overlooked source of history that can also be used to involve students in documenting local history." Oral history is a method for preserving family as well as community folklore. Students should be encouraged to interview older family members and community folklore as soon as possible because when we lose these tradition bearers, we lose these their wisdom and knowledge.
