#### More about Our Speaker

Larry E. Caver, Jr. was born in Birmingham, Alabama in 1967. He moved as a small child with his parents to Okaloosa County, Florida. His family resided in Destin, Ft. Walton Beach, and Crestview before moving to Mobile, Alabama in 1975. He attended Mobile College, the University of Alabama at Birmingham, and Liberty University in Lynchburg, Virginia, where he obtained the Associate of Arts Degree (1991). He also attended Wallace State Community College in Hanceville, Alabama where he took several courses in Genealogy and Family History Research. He has written and compiled several family histories and genealogical sources including: The Caver Family of North America, My German-American Roots, Oberlag-Pottebaum Family Histories, The History of the Tyus Family, Death and Notices from the Prattville Progress (1890-1910), Death, Marriage and Probate Notices from Montgomery, Alabama Newspapers, Volume I (1821-1865), Death and Marriage Notices from Jefferson County, Alabama Newspaper, Volume I (1854-1881).

Mr. Caver is an active member in several **genealogical societies** in Alabama, especially the **Autauga Genealogical Society** and the **Montgomery Genealogical Society**. He has also **spoken to several groups** across Alabama on many **genealogical related topics**.

# News from the Past: (almost) One Hundred (and more) Years Ago This Month

□ From the <u>Pine Belt News</u>, May 20, 1903, a column entitled "Alabama's Easy Condition":

"Under Governor Jelks' careful supervision Alabama is living on Easy street. It is estimated that there will be on hand

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when the legislature meets in December about \$100,000 more than the treasury held two years ago when Governor Samford became governor. The result will not be due to an increase in the tax rate, and it will be accomplished in the face of heavily increased payments to the old soldiers of the state, to the public schools, and to the constitutional convention.

"The **convicts** are now so well managed that they earn a net profit of \$150,000 year, a sum far in excess of previous earnings. The insurance department is also turning in handsome sums, and the valuations of property are rising year by year. They stood in 1896 at \$242,000,000 and in 1901 at \$286,000,000. They may go to \$300,000,000 this year.

- □ From the **Atmore Spectrum**, May 27, 1904
  - The annual reunion of the "General Clanton Camp" of the U. C. V. was held in Brewton at the court house. Forty-five "comrades" were present. Also attending the Meeting was the "Chapter of Daughters."
    - W. S. Neal (Commander), T. J. Stevens (First Vice-Commander), W. J. Holland, Second Vice-Commander), J. M. Davison (Adjutant), E. P. Loveless (Quartermaster), J. W. Terry (Sergeant Major), W. J. Jackson (Treasurer), and Rev. E. A. Smith (Chaplain), were elected to another term.
    - Sponsor and maids of honor appointed for the camp for the next reunion were Anna Slaughter, sponsor, and Mary H.
       Sowell, Anna Marie Davison, and Alyce Miller, maids of honor.
    - Mrs. G. W. L. Smith, secretary of the Chapter of Daughters, gave an invitation to "all honorably discharged veterans to make application through her chapter for crosses of honor."
  - From the "Brewton News" column: Dr. P. H. M. Tippin was reported as having returned to Brewton from Charity Hospital of New Orleans where he had been taking a special course in surgery.
  - From the "Lottie News" column: R. M. Chambliss, Superintendent, and A. A, Drew, Chairman of the Committee, write of a union day celebration: "We have a post office, two stores and two churches, and there is a union Sunday school at New Home Free Will Baptist church, and every preparation is

being made to make the **Children's Day** a grand success, it having been changed to **New Home church** instead of **Free Point Methodist church**, as originally planned. This change was desired by a majority and was unavoidable. It meets at **New Home church** on the second Sunday in June, at 10 a. m. **A grand treat**. Everybody is invited. **Dinner on the grounds**. We have a **fine spring of water** and good shade." A postscript adds "**Preaching** at the **Methodist church** at 3 p. m. on the same day."

- From the "Local News":
  - The Ladies Aid Society of the Methodist church gave an ice cream supper at Peavy Hall for the benefit of the church.
  - An advertisement from a local drug store: "Do you smoke?
     Then go to Dr. A. P. Wedb's drug store and ask for that little cigar, 'Lover's Choice.' It's fine."
  - Mr. Tom Bucey of Century was in town inquiring for stray cattle
  - Blank mortgages, warrants, affidavits and turpentine leases were for sale in the newspaper office.
  - A new post office had just been established at Bratt, eight miles south of Atmore, referred to as "in the Godwin neighborhood." Joe Hanks was the post master.
  - Robinsonville also had just received a post office. Mrs. J.
     C. Gully was the postmistress. "The place is about seven miles northeast of Atmore and is in one of the finest agricultural sections of the county."
- From the "Canoe" column, a reference to the opening of the missionary barrels with Miss Mattie Hall winning the Bible as a prize for collecting the most money.
- □ From the **Atmore Spectrum**, May 25, 1905
  - Reverend George W. McRae returned from Bon Secour, where he had assisted in a "protracted meeting."
  - Trains had started going on a regular schedule on the Bay Minette and Fort Morgan railroad.
  - One of the horses of Mr. A. B. Tennant was reported to have "dropped dead in harness Sunday afternoon between Atmore and the Fowler place."
  - Mr. and Mrs. W. M. Carney had returned from a visit to

Tennessee. They had been in a railway wreck near Columbia Tennessee. Mrs. Carney was reported to be "slightly bruised about the face as a result of the wreck."

- Robbins & McGowin of Brewton advertised "Imitation Panama Hats for 75c.," stating "It's the best cheap imitation of the Panama Hat yet made. These look well for a cheap negligee hat."
- □ From the <u>Atmore Spectrum</u>, May 24, 1906, an article entitled "Electric Lights Now in Operation":

The Atmore Mill & Gin Company installed an electric light plant. About 300 lights were connected with 150 more to be connected within a short time. The lights were giving night service only at the time of the article, but when the lines were finished, the article reported that the company assured citizens that the power would be on from "6 a.m. to 5 a.m. with 5 minutes at each 12 o'clock for oiling." The company had donated an arc light for the railroad crossing and planned to solicit public subscriptions for arc lights for the other crossings.

• The Atmore Mill & Gin Company had received machinery which doubled its capacity, from producing eleven bales a day to the capability of producing thirty-five bales a day.
