The September Meeting

The Bank of Brewton

The Bank's First President, Charles L. Sowell, was employed in the milling and lumbering business until the Civil War broke out. He enlisted and took part in "the bloody battles of Murfreesboro, Mission Ridge, Lookout Mountain, Chickamauga, Franklin and Nashville." Wounded in the left arm in the Nashville battle (a rifle ball shattered the bone and his arm had to be removed at the shoulder), he was made a prisoner.

After the war, he was appointed as station agent for the L & N Railroad at Brewton. In 1869 he resigned and engaged in the timber business, buying and selling timber and eventually building a large saw mill which employed a large work force. By 1888 the citizens of Brewton, as well as Mr. Sowell, could see that Brewton needed a bank. Mr. Sowell disposed of his mill in that year and organized the first bank in Escambia County, the Bank of Brewton, which opened for business on Monday, January 7, 1889. At the time it was the only bank between Mobile and Montgomery.

The first bank building was on West Saint Joseph Street. The <u>Standard</u> <u>Gauge</u> (predecessor of the <u>Brewton Standard</u>) on January 10, 1889 announced the bank was open for business: "Bank of Brewton is open for business. C. L. Sowell, President; O. F. Luttrell, Cashier." The newspaper

continues, "The new bank building is a model of elegance. Mr. Sowell has put in one of Diebol's large safes, a large fire and burglar proof vault, with the very best combination locks made. He has shown good taste in having his counters made of our native curled pine, oil finished and varnished, showing the beautiful texture of the wood."

In 1912 the bank moved to a new building next to the Lovelace Hotel. This building is still part of the Bank today, and is recognizable for its "façade of imported, white tile decorated with a green border."




Fig. 2. Picture of the Old Shell Station in Brewton. Picture courtesy of the Montgomery Advertiser Web Site.
