
ECHS Aids in Creating Presentations on Local History of Escambia County in the Traveling Exhibit "Making Alabama."

Kevin Sumlin College Football Coach

Born in Brewton in 1964 where his father was the head coach at Brooker T. Washington High School, the family moved to Indianapolis where Kevin was a star player in several sports. He was a starting linebacker at Purdue University. His career as a college football coach began in 1989 at Washington State. His first head coaching job came with the University of Houston in 2008. Presently Head Coach at the University of

Arizona.



Lee Otts (1922-2015) Brewton

Born in Greensboro, Alabama, he attended the **University of** Alabama where he was in the ROTC. In 1944 he was sent to France as a replacement infantry officer of G Company, part of Patton's Third Army. His memories of his war experiences were eventually part of the book G Company's War. After the war he obtained his law degree and moved to **Brewton** where he founded a law firm and was active in civic activities.



Leon Brooks Hines (1947-1985) (Brewton)

Community Leader-Politician In 1974, at the age of 27, Hines was elected to the Alabama House of Representatives, becoming the youngest member ever elected to that position. Former Lt. **Governor George** McMillan was quoted as saying of Hines, "He had a balanced approach, was dedicated to excellence, and fought for Alabama to reach its potential."

Left the stock brokerage business and moved to California where he established his own investment management business which eventually became the Capita Group.



James W. Carroll (1921-2005) (Brewton)

"Reluctant" Hero of World War II

Juliet Downing Pope (1905-1988) Co-Founder of Cypress Gardens

Born in Brewton, moved to Florida with her husband Richard Pope in 1936. Helped to usher in Florida's modern age of tourism with Cypress Gardens attraction at Winter Haven.



Joseph H. Lyons (Pollard) Attorney-Businessman

Born on October 31, 1874 in Pollard, he grew up there, attending local schools and later attended Marion Institute. Received degree

from the University of Alabama and Harvard (law degree). Moved to Mobile and became a successful attorney and leader in many civic and humanitarian projects and organizations.
